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

GAME OF MOANS

Feelings can be hurt, egos damaged, and nerves put on edge! Sounds like fun, huh! Well, truth be told, it is. As crazy as it makes you feel, it's so engaging, demanding, challenging, and more, that we just can't get enough. I sometimes feel like a bridge addict. I play on the computer, play on my cell phone, and of course, come to the Bridge Center and play. It's a self-serve event that can fill your plate with a bountiful of emotions. So what's really behind this little game called Bridge?



History of Bridge

The origin of playing cards was in China, where paper was invented, and dates back to around the year 1120. Originally, cards were used for fortune telling and gambling. Cards were introduced into Italy and Spain around 1370, probably coming from Egypt. Tarot cards, used for fortune telling, were introduced in Italy in 1440.

In 1432, Saint Bernardo warned the "Faithful" that cards were invented by the Devil, later picked up by the English Puritans -- often regarded a "The Devil's Picture Book". By 1495, Henry VII issued a Decree forbidding his servants from playing cards except during the Christmas Holiday.

Later, Elizabeth the First levied a tax on the manufacture of playing cards, which generated significant revenues for the Crown. By the era of Queen Anne, card playing was in full swing. Men preferred Piquet, women loved Ombre, while the Clergy and Country Squires played Whist. Have you ever wondered why the Ace of Spades looks so distinctive? Well, it was the official stamp of certification to indicate that the proper English tax was paid on that deck of cards (the Stamp Office kept the only stock of pre-stamped Aces of Spades) -- the card manufacturers were forbidden to produce that Ace. This tax was imposed all the way through 1960.

And we continue to play on and on. I love it, don't you?

This hand is from one of Bobby Wolf's last newspaper articles. He states that it is one of the most fascinating hands he had ever seen:

Although the theme of ducking aces to keep them from being ruffed away does not occur all



that often in real life it is meat and drink to the constructers of puzzles.

This variation on that theme only came up once, which makes it ideal for a memorable deal. The first time it was documented, Tim Seres of Australia deserved huge credit for solving it at the table.

You can predict the sequence of events if declarer were a normal mortal. West leads the spade Q and it is covered and ruffed. East shifts to a diamond and in due course collects a slow diamond trick and the club A. Now the normal declarer has nowhere to discard that third -round spade loser. Seres, however, having been warned by the auction of the spade ruff, decided to thwart destiny by ducking the first trick!

West could do no better than to continue a top spade, covered and ruffed by East. Now, on the diamond shift, Seres won, drew trumps and then finessed the spade to find a home for his diamond loser, claiming 10 tricks.

By ducking the first trick, Seres had gained a tempo in his attempt to establish a home for his slow diamond loser; however, it was with the aid of a maneuver that would be unlikely to recur again in any lifetime.

In my opinion, this shows how fantastic this game can be.


