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

A Manfred Michlmayr Memory

Manfred Michlmayr, who passed in February of this year, was a very fine bridge player and a longtime member of Unit 499 who cut his serious bridge-playing teeth as an employee in Chevron's San Francisco lunchroom.

Having retained his connection to his native Austria, he remained fluent in both German and English, and likely other languages as well. My late wife Andrea had passed in April 2011. A couple of months later Manfred telephoned to tell me that I needed to get out of the house to play bridge and be his partner. I don't remember who sat where, but our first-round opponents at the following week's Berkeley – Richmond Sectional Pair Game were Mike Bandler and Chris Pisarra. We knew each other well and all of us were frequently Manfred's partner and opponent at the bridge table.

I was vulnerable in fourth seat holding a decent 14 HCP count and had opened the bidding one of I forget which suit.

Manfred responded 1NT which ended the auction. To my disappointment, Mike and Chris captured seven tricks and we ended up minus 100 on the deal. Did you have the ten of hearts, I asked, trying to figure out what had happened. "Nine" replied Manfred, grinning back at me. Chris Pisarra piped in: "That is the correct answer in both languages", he said. We all laughed.

Irwin Lichtblau/Furqan Naeem, and David Geary/Sue Ellington were third and fourth respectively, for four and three points.

B Strat: Unit 499 = 21, Unit 502 = zip

At this point, Unit 499 seemed in control, but wait, Unit 502 C Strat and 799ers played a steady game. Winners from Unit 499 for the C strat were Don Levine/Tom Pajak and Barry Mantel/David Terris.

The afternoon session was tough. Maybe Unit 499 players were N/S and not standing up. The final tally for the day was East Bay scoring forty Tunnel points and Unit 499 scoring thirty-three tunnel points.

Tunnel points are weighted for placing first within the your strat.

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Last months deal was an easy double squeeze. This month's deal involves a squeeze with some variations.

This deal was part of a local team game with some very good players. Although my hand is "light" I think it is important to open 1H. If you pass and they open and raise spades this hand is not good enough to overcall hearts so that is why you should open it.

My partner bid 5H over the 3S prempt which asks me to bid 6 if I have second round control of spades or better and since I had very good controls I cue bid spades and my partner then showed his club control saying he was interested in 7 and I said "no way" and signed off in 6H.

The opening lead was the 8C which I liked and won in my hand and I cashed two high hearts and came back to my hand with a spade and cashed the other spade noting East had 2 of them. I cashed the other 2 clubs noting that West had a singleton therefore he had 5 diamonds. I put East in with his trump and he led the 6D which I played the 8 and West covered with the 9, my Q winning in dummy. I came back to my hand with a trump. At that point dummy had the JS, and the A2 diamonds. My hand was a high trump and the JD and the 3D.

I then led the last trump and West was forced to save the QS so he discarded a diamond and I discarded the JS from dummy and took the last two tricks with good diamonds.


Knowing all that, I could have taken the diamond finesse earlier and cashed the AD before putting East in with his trump and he would have been down to all clubs, giving me a sluff and ruff.

Of course a squeeze or end-play is more fun than a finesse, this hand plays easily when West shows 6-5 in spades and diamonds after showing up with singletons in both hearts and clubs.

CCBC continues its efforts in 2025 to provide the maximum number of games offering extra MPs to our players. We are providing 4 more weeks of special games in May, plus a one-time special game for newcomers. Lots of chances to win extra MPs.

ACBL recently added "glitter" point games, which award red, silver and/or gold MPs at the club. These are referred to as "Go Local" games. CCBC has added these games to our schedule to take advantage of them for our players. They do not pay extra MPs, but do pay these "glitter" points. No extra charge for these games.

Week of May 5 Stardust week – 25% gold MPs, extra \$

Week of May 12 – Club Championships – extra MPs, no extra charge

Week of May 19 – Royal STaC (1/4 each black, red, gold and silver MPs), extra MPs, extra \$

Friday, May 23, 11AM – Special Under 20MP game for newer players. Mentors will be available to help with logistics and bidding questions. The game is open to ACBL members with fewer than 20 MPs and non-ACBL members. A chance to try duplicate bridge in a relaxed atmosphere with players hav-

ing similar experience. Pre-registration is required via Unit 499 website – unit499.com. You may sign up with your favorite partner or as a single, and we will match you with a partner. Cost is \$5. It will be a club championship, paying extra MPs. CCBC plans to have another 3 of these games on Fridays for newer players. The next one is scheduled for June 20.

Game time is at 10am, so please arrive earlier. Table Fee: \$10/person.

Our current schedule of Bridge Classes on Mondays from 9:30 – 11:30am:

The last Play of the Hand class will be on May 5 on Chapter 9.

The Class on Defense will commence on Monday, June 2, and run for 9 sessions at a cost of \$200/person and includes the textbook. Class dates: June 2, 9, 16, 23, 30; July 7 (no 14), 21, and 28; August 4.

We use the ACBL textbooks to teach bridge from beginning to intermediate and advanced. All Series meet once per week for two hours. The Cost is \$200 which includes the Textbook. Any student wishing to repeat a series can do so for \$100.

Our Monday Afternoon Seminars will be from 1-3pm at a cost of \$20/session.

These seminars will be will be deep dives into Doubles, Negative and Takeout.

Bridge is a partnership game and both partners need to be on the same page in their understandings. This is not to say that you as an individual won't do well sometimes, but rather, that your success rate will improve.

4 bidding positions: 1) opener; 2) over-caller; 3) responder; 4) advancer

We are going to take a deep dive into doubles: This is a very fluid situation and how you proceed depends on your hand and distribution: Trust your partner-not the opponents (If you don't trust your bridge playing partner then there are two options 1- find another partner; 2- live with it and accept the results- divorce ACBL style can be tough)

May 5- Takeout doubles (what you promise partner in points and distribution). Using TOX Takeout doubles when you have a big hand/suit and how your partner has to pivot in their expectations. Takeout doubles when you have a big no-trump hand. Are Stayman and Jacoby transfers still in applicable?

May 12 - I have opened and LHO makes a TOX. Responder. (my partner) makes a bid-What now?

May 19- I have opened and LHO makes a TOX. Responder passes. What does advancer do?

May 26 no session

June 2- I have opened and RHO makes a TOX. Responder makes a bid and now what does advancer bid with some values?

June 9- Negative doubles. When and why? What are the parameters?

June 16- Advancer's bidding after RHO makes a negative double.

June 23- I open the bidding and an overcall is made by my LHO. Partner (responder) makes a negative double. Back to me as opener. What now?

Please sign up in advance for any future classes with Winnie by phone or email or text (see contact information at the end).

As in the past, reservations will be required for all Face-to-Face duplicate games. Wearing masks will be optional. (All games are awarded Master Points and Pair Games have hand records available and posted on the results page at www.https://my.acbl.org/club-results/271973.)
